

When you contact your federal representatives

To empower our members and allies who advocate for public education issues and labor issues with the Oregon Congressional Delegation, the OEA Congressional Advocacy Team (CAT) will create a Venn diagram describing the issues dealt with on the Federal level and those dealt with on the State level. The work is in progress, and a circle for the school board issues may be included as well.

Examples of Federal legislation include student and educator rights, retention of educators, and safe and healthy buildings. Federal law addresses the issue of retention with legislation such that to

make home ownership more accessible to educators (the HELPER Act); to increase educator pay; and to resolve overwhelming student debt. In the area of retirement and social security safeguards, NEA and the CAT are working to repeal laws such as the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) and Government Pension Offset (GPO), through which more than 2.5 million hard-working Americans, including many educators, have or will have their Social Security benefits reduced—or lose them entirely.

Health and safety efforts include student and

Benefits of union membership

According to Axios.com (market@axios.com) information from an analysis from the think tank Center for American Progress, there's a massive wealth gap between workers in unions and non-unionized workers across education levels.

Typically, unionized workers earn about 10 percent-15 percent more than their nonunion peers. However, this article concludes these wealth gaps are far wider, an indication that the benefits of union membership likely accrue to workers over time.

While education beyond a high school diploma is still one of the best paths to accumulating wealth, the Center for American Progress points to an alternative for those who might not want to spend the time or money on a college education—Union Membership.

The article asks you to consider the following:

- Aside from higher pay, union members have more job security.
- Members are also likely to have defined benefit retirement plans, i.e. pensions, and access to better health care, so are less apt to go into debt when they're sick.
- Overall, those in unions had a median wealth of \$338,482 compared to \$199,948 for nonunion workers.

- Union workers had a higher homeownership rate (71 percent versus 65 percent for nonunion), and 60 percent had a defined benefit pension versus 24 percent of the nonunion group.
- Unionized workers with no high school diploma have more than three times the wealth of their nonunion peers.
- Those with some college under their belts, maybe an associate's degree, have two-and-half times the wealth. Folks in this group could include those in health care, like nurses or dental hygienists.
- Even college-educated union members are outpacing their peers. Workers in this category would include teachers, college professors, journalists, government employees, and many nonprofit workers.



Have you wondered about gargoyles?

You walk up to a wall of the old church and look up. Above you is a stone creature, man or animal, devil or angel—it's gross, but fascinating. What is it? Why is it there?

If you are in Europe or the UK, most likely what you see on the wall is either a gargoyle or a grotesque. Why it's there depends upon what it is. But whatever it is can be found on medieval churches, cathedrals, or town buildings. In my travels I've seen and photographed the sculptures in every corner of Scotland, England, Wales, and even some in Ireland.

What are they? Gargoyles are decorated rainwater spouts that project out of a wall to carry water away from the wall. Think of them as fancy rain gutters. Grotesques, although they look like gargoyles, are decorative sculptures attached to a building for decoration and have no architectural purpose. Most of the sculptures we see are grotesques, which are far more common than gargoyles.

Why are they there? Gargoyles obviously have the

architectural purpose of helping to protect the building's wall from rain damage. The figures are made to look evil or menacing to help ward off evil and also as a reminder of the separation between earth and heaven. It's postulated that more exaggerated figures may also serve to scare parishioners into a more holy life.

Grotesques serve the same decorative and social purposes, obvious without the physical protective function.

Some of the best places to see both types of sculpture, at least from my travels in Scotland, include Melrose Abbey in the Borders, Rosslyn Chapel (Da Vinci Code fame) near Edinburgh, and Brechin Cathedral near the Highlands.

While in England, you can find great carvings at the small Kilpeck Church in Herefordshire or at the Winchcombe Parish Church, Gloucestershire.

And, Oxford is a town filled with both gargoyles and grotesques. On your next trip (or looking over photos of past trips) try to decide: Gargoyle or Grotesque.


