Two engaging keynote speakers are planned.

Nico Spadafora, the

owner and lead educator for The Fossil Team and lead researcher and manager at the North American Bigfoot Center will share his adventures. He also created The Fossil Team, a traveling museum that uses fossils and modern animal bones to teach the public about the world we live in.

Our second keynote speaker is Lisa Riversong Franklin an artist, athlete and active businesswoman. She is the Curator and Tribal Liaison for R.L.K. and Company. This company holds the operating permit for the National Historic Landmark Building Timberline Lodge and ski area. She also serves as the Tribal Liaison by managing relationships with local tribes and is an Alpine Ski Trainer

There will be several programs to choose from ranging from brain health, mountain search and rescue and the science behind Bigfoot.

Our UniServ Consultant Lesly Muñoz will give us legislative updates. She was elected last fall as an Oregon State Representative for the first time from Woodburn.

Random remarks

Oregonians started the spring off by being asked to join a nationwide "Hands Off!" action to demonstrate resistance to the many cuts and roll backs coming out of the current administration.

On April 5, thousands of us across the state, including many OEA-Retired members,

came together in their communities in support of this collective action. Creative signs were made to say such things as, "Hand's Off ...our Social Security, our Medicare, our immigrants, our public education, our healthcare, our personal data, our free speech, our environment, etc."

Citizens organized in communities large and small, rural, suburban and urban to protest the lawlessness and cruelty of the current Trump administration. Tens of thousands of protesters turned out across the country to support this day of action. On June 14, Flag Day, and coincidently, Donald Trump's Birthday, he ordered a massive display of tanks and military personnel to parade in his honor. A national day of action was declared for this same day, called, "No Kings!"

Once again across Oregon and our nation a national day of defiance was organized. Many of us participated in peaceful demonstrations in our communities to protest authoritarianism, to demonstrate that the flag does not belong to President Trump and to show the world what a true democracy looks like. The numbers of protestors across our country, far out numbered the lightly attended military parade in Washington, D.C.

On July 16, the Supreme Court ruled that the Trump administration could move ahead with plans to lay off half the workforce in the Department of Education. These measures will result in cuts to programs for students with disabilities and for students living in poverty, as well as cuts to Pell Grants and student loan programs. There is an expectation that states and individual localities will pick up these costs, even though most school districts have already developed their budgets for the coming school *Continued on Page 4*.

Every effort should be made to keep cuts as far away from classrooms and direct student services, as possible. For example, school districts should not be increasing administrative staff.

What can we do? We must pay attention! We must continue to support organized actions in our communities! There is evidence that these protest rallies are having an impact. Not so much on the Washington administration, but on local elected representatives concerned about their upcoming elections.

Our congressional representatives, most of whom are supportive of our educational legislative goals, need to hear that we appreciate their efforts to fight the proposed cuts and rollbacks. We need to thank them for their continued efforts on our behalf.

We need to keep up the pressure by attending the protests, participating in virtual and in-person town hall meetings of our Senators and Representatives and by joining NEA's FastAction to send pertinent emails to our congressional representatives.


